'Why Cowboys Need A Brand' tells the story of Slim Jim Watkins who never says "can't." With his can do attitude Slim takes on all the jobs the other cowboys



don't want and shows his determination and good work ethic. Because of his hard work Slim is given a horse, some cattle, and even his own land. But he knows one thing, to have a ranch you have to have a brand. Slim decides to focus on what he Can Do and the perfect CD brand comes to mind.



'Why Cowboys Sleep With Their Boots On' also tells the story of Slim Jim Watkins learning a lesson on being a cowboy. While Slim is out on the range he runs into some bad luck with pesky

desert critters running off with his hat, handkerchiefs and even his britches! After having to ask fellow cowboys to borrow their things until he could get his replaced, Slim decided it was best if he just slept in everything including his boots.

'Cowgirl Alphabet' teaches kids all the letters and relates them to words you would use around a ranch and how they apply to the cowgirl lifestyle, such as;



"B"is for Beautiful Boots, "C" is for Cowgirls, "D" is for Dawn to Dusk because a cowgirl works from sunup to sundown, "H" is for Horse, and "L" is for Lasso.

But as many know there is plenty to do outside the corrals as Marilyn prepared the lunch for the cowboys during brandings and participated in cattle oriented organizations and tradeshows. She served as a two term President of the San Joaquin/Stanislaus Cattlewomen

Association and held offices of President and Secretary of the California State Cattlewomen. She has also lobbied in Sacramento and Washington D.C. with the Cattlemen and California Beef Council. Congratulations Marilyn!
